ALUMNI NEWS



MARK SCHELL

Mark Schell and Paul Winfield, graduates of the Los Angeles City Col-

lege Theatre Arts Department, have joined two of the new United States repertory companies. Mark Schell recently signed a contract with the American Conservatory Theatre, one of the nation's leading professional repertory companies,

which performs in rotating repertory in two theatres for the city of San Francisco. This company brings together and provides year-round employment for the nation's finest directors, actors, playwrights, educators, craftsmen and administrators in theatre arts. From its beginning in 1965. the A.C.T. has been both a performing group and a training institute, in order that every member of the company can continue to grow as an individual and as a creative artist. Mr. Schell became a member of this successful company when they were looking for new members in the summer of 1967. The was one of three actors selected after approximately 400 actors had been auditioned. He is currently performing in their productions of "Tartuffe," "Twelfth Night," and "Under Milkwood."

While attending Los Angeles City College, Mr. Schell appeared as Cassio in "Othello," Lysander in "Midsummer Night's Dream," Juan in "Yerma," and as the Actor in "Six Characters in Search of an Author," the production which won the American Educational Theatre national competition. In addition, he was voted Outstanding Actor in the Theatre Arts Department during his last semester. Shortly after leaving Los Angeles City College, Mr. Schell bedame a member of and began his activities with the American Conservatory Theatre.

Paul Winfield is currently a member of the Los Angeles Inner-City Repertory Company, a professional repertory company with 17 actor members. The purpose of this federally-supported company is to provide first- rate professional threatre for both students and adults. The educational Laboratory Theatre Project, which is connected with the Los Angeles City Board of Education, is a projected three-year project which will provide a series of four plays each year for every current tenth grade student in the Los Angeles Unified School District. The company also provides a subscription season of productions, which run from September through June, for adult threatre-goers in the Los Angeles area. During this past season, Mr. Winfield has appeared in the Inner-City productions of "Tartuffe" as the Police Officer, and "The Glass Menagerie" as The Gentleman Caller.

While attending Los Angeles City College, Mr. Winfield appeared as Othello in "Othello," Creon in "Antigone," as the Logician in "Rhinoceros," and as the Director in the prize-winning production of "Six Characters in Search of an Author." Prior to his association with the Inner-City Repertory



Company, Mr. Winfield was a member of the Stanford Repertory Company, where he appeared in "Anthony and Cleopatra," "The Cherry Orchard," "Out at Sea," and "Once in a Lifetime." Mr. Winfield also appeared locally in the play "In White America," and starred in Burgess Meredith's production of "The Dutchman" before joining the Los Angeles Inner-City Repertory Company.

Professor Jerry Blunt's new book, "Stage Dialects," has just been published by Chandler Publishing Company. The dialect book works with tapes so that the student can actually hear the correct sounds in the various dialects and imitates them until perfected.

Professor Blunt's book "The Composite Art of Acting" was recently

published by the Macmillan Company and is an outstanding success.

In addition to his many activities at L.A.C.C., Mr. Blunt is involved in numerous theatrical organizations. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Center Theatre Group, resident theatre company of the Los Angeles Music Center, and he is on the Eexecutive Council of the American Educational Theatre Association. He is also past president of the Los Angeles County Drama Association, the Southern California Little Theatre Conference, and American Educational Theatre Association.

Mr. Blunt has been associated with the Santa Monica Theatre Guild, the Laguna Players, the Carmel Theatre of the Golden Bough, and the Hollywood Playcrafters, among others. He has contributed articles to the

Los Angeles Drama Association Review, The Thespian Magazine, the Western Journal of Speech, the Educational Theatre Journal and the Theatre Annual.


