

The KC/ACTF is a program of the Kennedy Center Education Department, which also includes youth and family programs, professional development opportunities for teachers, and performances for school groups, the Kennedy Center Alliance for Arts Education, the Performing Arts Centers and School Program, performance enhancement events, national and community outreach initiatives, the Kennedy Center Internship Program, and the National Symphony Orchestra education program. The Kennedy Center also works closely with Very Special Arts, an educational affiliate of the Kennedy Center.

Last year more than 800 productions and 17,000 students participated inthe American College Theater Festival nationwide. By entering this production, the Academy is sharing in the KC/ACTF goals to help college theater grow and to focus attention on the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
