Books. Bedding. Bags of late-night snacks?

These college essentials and many other items—can quickly add up, especially if you’re an international student using a foreign bank account. If you’re accessing your home country account while in the U.S., you’re likely to get hit with charges such as international transaction and currency exchange fees.

Opening a U.S. account will put an end to those added fees, while providing a host of other benefits. For instance, you can:

- *Easily pay rent, utility or mobile phone bills.* It’s simple to keep the bill-paying convenience going by setting automatic transfers for recurring payments.
- *Receive funds from another U.S. account in a speedy manner.* You’ll get that paycheck, financial aid or scholarship money faster through a U.S.-to-U.S. transaction than you would if it were going into a foreign account.
- *Keep your money safe.* A bank checking or savings account is a much better option than hiding any large amounts of cash you brought from home in your dorm room dresser.

- *Take the first steps to establish a U.S. credit history.* Responsible use of a secured U.S. credit card will help you to build a strong domestic credit score. The issuers of secured cards often require an applicant to have a bank account.

Sounds interesting. How do I get started?

First, you’ll need to do a little research. Ask fellow international classmates and the school’s international student office for bank suggestions. Check out bank websites and read online reviews. Study up on the location of cash machines (also known as Automatic Teller Machines, or ATMs) to make sure they are near campus. You’ll pay fees if you use an ATM that is outside your bank’s network.

Then call or stop into a bank to get more details. Inquire about all potential **bank fees**. If you plan to travel outside the country, ask the bank for information on international in-network ATMs

Cell Phones, Pay Phones, and Calling Cards

Some cell phone companies allow you to rent or buy a temporary international cell phone; or you can use an international phone plan from your current carrier.

Prepaid phone cards also allow you to make international phone calls for a flat fee. The internet is also a great way to keep in touch.

International Phone Card: Getting an international phone card is beneficial because you do not have to be concerned with bad reception or lack of signal inherent in many cell phones. The cards can be recharged and can be purchased in the United States or abroad.

Many pay phones these days do not accept cash. Instead, the phone cards can be swiped at the payphone to make a call. Ask your current long distance provider if they are able to give you discounted rates for international calls. A monthly fee will apply, and your phone company can send you an international calling card with a special access number. However, you will be billed the usual United States long distance rates. The cards can be used at regular landlines as well.

ISI Connect Card: The ISICConnect card is a prepaid, rechargeable phone card offered by the International Student Travel Confederation (ISTC). ISTC also provides the International Student Identity Card (ISIC). Students studying abroad can get a card and save up to 70 percent on calls in more than 150 countries. It can be recharged over the Internet or by phone, and the voicemail it provides costs family and friends nothing to leave a message for the student.

Internet & Email

Find out if you will have access to the internet in your area. The internet is the most cost-effective way to communicate while in the U.S. Instant messengers, email, Skype, and Google Hangouts are great ways to communicate. Wi-fi and internet are abundant in most major cities. Your host university and community library should have computers connected to the internet available for use free of charge.

Receiving Mail

If you will be abroad for an extended period, you may want to arrange for the delivery of your mail. Some banks and international credit card companies handle mail for customers at their U.S. branches. In addition, post offices in many countries will hold mail for travelers under their General Delivery (Poste Restante) services. Check with your embassy to see if that will be possible there. Foreign embassy and consulate contact information can also be found on the Country Specific Information for each country.

Create a Schedule

Discuss what time of day you can be reached by family and friends before you leave. Contact your phone service provider to discuss best plans for international calling. To save on telephone communication, set up a regular schedule for e-mailing, instant messaging or talking via Skype.

DMV - Driver's License Application Process

While the application process for receiving a driver's license may be different in each state, the basic steps are very similar. These steps include:

- Confirming with your Designated School Official (DSO) that your student record is Active in the [Student and Exchange Visitor Information System](#).
- Waiting 10 days after arriving in the United States to apply for a driver's license so that your [Form I-94, "Arrival/Departure Record,"](#) information can be updated in all the government systems.
- Visiting and submitting the proper documentation to the DMV.

The DMV may need to verify your nonimmigrant student status to determine if you are eligible for a driver's license. To verify your status, the DMV may use the Systematic Alien Verification for Entitlements ([SAVE](#)) Program. When you apply for a driver's license at your local DMV, make sure to bring original copies of the following documents:

- All signed versions of your [Form I-20, "Certificate of Eligibility for Nonimmigrant Student Status."](#)
- A valid passport and your most recent student visa (Please note that you do not need a visa if you are from a visa-exempt country, such as Canada or Bermuda).
- Proof of residence. This varies from state to state and you should check your local DMV's website to ensure you understand what is needed to fulfill this requirement.
- If your state requires it, an SSN card or a [Form SSA-L676, "Refusal to Process SSN Application."](#)
- If you are on optional practical training, bring your [Form I-766, "Employment Authorization Document."](#) The DMV will use the A number on this card to verify your status.

If you are an F-2, M-2 or J-2 dependent, go to the DMV with your primary F-1, M-1 or J-1 and make sure you both have all your required documents.

After a successful application process, a DMV official will explain the next steps for attaining your driver's license. It is normal for some nonimmigrants to only get temporary licenses. In addition, you may receive the license immediately or you may have to wait several weeks, depending on the state.

Additional Requirements

A driver's license applicant may also need to pass both a driving and written test. Depending on your state, if you have a license from your home country or another state, the DMV may not require you to take the tests. However, not all states accept driver's licenses from other countries.

ADJUSTING TO LIFE IN THE U.S.

For most students, the first week after arriving at their US university is the most challenging time of their entire study in the USA. Not only will you be dealing with overcoming homesickness, but you also will be adapting to a new culture, language, and more. To make this journey a little easier for you, here are a few top tips for international students looking to find out how to survive in the USA as a student.

1. Make a Budget for Your Life in the US

- Housing
- Meal plans, personal grocery shopping, or eating out
- Traveling by public transport or by car
- Entertainment, extracurriculars, and other personal spending habits

2. **Develop Your Language Skills.** Improve your English with online tutorials, podcasts, and even TV shows and movies.

3. **Join a Society or Club.** Explore your interests, Discover new hobbies, Meet new people

4. **Immerse Yourself in the Culture.** Visit restaurants and other local attractions

5. **Familiarize Yourself with Local Laws.** Be aware of local laws, including speed limits when driving, when local parks close, and other regional considerations. If you have questions about what is allowed, reach out to your student advisors for specific guidance.

6. **Make Several Copies of Your Passport and Important Documents.** Student visa, Form I-20, Admissions letter, Health insurance, Medical records, Prescriptions, Academic documents, List of emergency contacts

POST ARRIVAL CHECKLIST

Before registering for your classes, there are mandatory steps for you to complete to ensure that you are on the right path. Please read the requirement checklist below and follow the steps!

STEP 1: LACC's Online Orientation

All new students must complete the LACC Online Orientation to receive early registration. We recommend that you complete the online orientation before your arrival in the U.S.

- Please login to your Student Portal at www.mycollege.laccd.edu
- Click on the "Orientation" tab on your right
- Follow the instructions, watch all the videos, and take the quizzes to receive full credit

STEP 2: F-1 Student Online Orientation & Zoom Group Check-in

You are required to complete the online F-1 Student Check-in and attend the Zoom Group Check-in. The online orientation can be taken through Canvas. Please review the following steps so that you can access your Online Orientation and attend the Zoom Group Check-in.

A. Login to your LACCD student email account. Accept the invitation for Canvas (International Student Program).

B. Login into Canvas. Select, International Student

Program. Then, select and complete the Modules. Watch this [Canvas Tutorial Video](#) for assistance.

C. Complete the F-1 Online Orientation (Six Modules).

STEP 3: ESL Guided Self-Placement

*If English is your second language, our college's English/ESL and Counseling departments highly recommend that you take the ESL guided self-placement test at LACC to determine your starting level before your registration for classes. NEW ARRIVAL FROM INSIDE THE US

Step 1: Obtain your new LACC I-20 from the International Student Office.

Step 2: Sign your name on page 1, line 11 on your new I-20

Step 3: Submit a photocopy of you signed I-20 to the International Student Office

Step 4: Report your U.S address to the International Student Office. This action must be completed within 10 days of your arrival.

SEVIS Transfer Students

- If you are changing schools within the US and transferring your SEVIS record to LACC there are visa and travel policies unique to your situation.
- You can travel with your current F1 visa and LACC I-20, even if the visa has the previous school's name on it, as long as the visa has not expired and you are not outside the US more than five months between academic programs.
- To receive your updated I-20 from LACC and to transfer your SEVIS record, your previous school's DSO must complete the section of the International Verification Form.
- You can use your LACC "transfer pending" I-20 to enter the US once without signature before the start date, even earlier than 30 days before the I-20 start date. The 30-day rule is only for travel with "initial" I-20s, not "transfer pending" I-20s. However, if you wish to travel outside the US after your initial entry on your LACC "transfer pending" I-20, you will need a travel signature from a DSO.

STUDENT DISCIPLINE PROCEDURES


Community college districts are required by law to adopt standards of student conduct along with applicable penalties for violation (Education Code Section 66017, 66300, 76030, and 76031). The Los Angeles Community College District has complied with this requirement by adopting Board Rule 9803, Standards of Student Conduct and 91101, Student Discipline Procedures.

The purpose of LACCD Board Rule 91101 is to provide uniform procedures to assure due process when a student is charged with a violation of the Standards of Student Conduct. All proceedings held in accordance with this Board Rule shall relate to an alleged violation of appropriate standards of student conduct. These provisions do not apply to grievance procedures, student organization councils and courts, or residence determination and other academic and legal requirements for admission and retention.

Disciplinary measures may be taken by the college independent of any charges filed through civil or criminal authorities, or both. Disciplinary action may include warning, reprimand, restitution, suspension, or expulsion from one or more classes, programs, activities, campus locations, or the entire district.


