LACC UNVEILS STATUE OF SEJONG THE GREAT (1397-1450), THE 4TH JOSEON DYNASTY KING AND INVENTOR OF HANGEUL, THE KOREAN ALPHABET

College holds statue unveiling ceremony and celebrates Hangeul Day

(September 25, Los Angeles) – Los Angeles City College (LACC) will host a ceremony to unveil the statue of Sejong the Great on Thursday, October 5, 2023, from 11:00am to 12:00pm in the Main Quad on campus. The event will also celebrate Hangeul Day (October 9), commemorating the invention and proclamation of the Korean alphabet.

The statue of King Sejong in central Seoul is considered South Korea's most iconic statue. The LACC King Sejong statue is sure to become a major landmark in Los Angeles, as the campus is near Koreatown.

LACCD Chancellor Dr. Francisco C. Rodriguez, Board Trustee (1st Vice President) Nichelle Henderson, and LACC President Dr. Amanuel Gebru will attend the event.

Andrew Lee, Chairman of Imperial Family Companies, who donated the statue and \$100,000 endowment for the LACC Korean Program; Yi Seok, the founding leader of Imperial Cultural Foundation of Korea, former congressman Mike Honda and Peter Asmar of Asmar Studio which created the statue will also be in attendance.

LACC students, staff, faculty, and local and community partners will join in the ceremony. The ceremony will conclude with congratulatory calligraphy performance by Laura C. Kim, the president of the Korean-American Calligraphy Association.

"We are thrilled to unveil the Sejong the Great statue on our campus. This remarkable work of art serves as a symbol of our commitment to embracing diversity, fostering cultural understanding, and celebrating the contributions of the Korean community and its rich heritage," said LACC President Gebru.

"Our Korean Program is now one of the largest in the U.S. No college or university can match us in accessibility, and the diversity of our students learning the Korean language and culture. King Sejong created Hangeul to make literacy available for all, beyond the ruling class.
